PILGRIMS HOSPICE

College lunch raises nearly £600

More than 70 people enjoyed a gastronomic delight at the East Kent College

restaurant in Broadstairs to raise nearly £600 for Pilgrims Hospices. The lunch was the latest arranged by Michael Shipley a volunteer with the hospice, who has raised much needed funds for Pilgrims for several years.

involved with the organisation and presentation of such a wonderful meal."

It costs more than £9.5 million to provide free care to all in East Kent who need it from the hospices in Thanet, Canterbury and Ashford, as well as caring for patients in their own homes.

2012 is a special year for Pilgrims Hospices as we celebrate caring for the people of east Kent for 30 years having opened the first hospice in 1982 Canterbury.

Today we provide palliative care for adults with a range of illnesses that cannot be cured including cancer, heart failure, respiratory conditions and neurological diseases.

Care is provided from the three sites in Canterbury, Ashford and Thanet, in patients'

homes and via community programmes. Care is also extended to families and carers. To keep delivering care to those that need it the most, Pilgrims has to raise in

excess of £9 million each year. The majority of this comes from our local community, so fundraising is very important. 80p in every pound goes directly on patient care and over 75% of our funding comes from the local community.

Also in 2012, Pilgrims Hospice Thanet is celebrating its 20th anniversary having

been opened in 1992. It has an inpatient unit, runs a series of day programmes and offers outpatient appointments as well as visiting services in patients own homes. It also hosts the only palliative care

accommodation in east Kent that is suitable for patients with dementia.

Situated on the main Ramsgate to Margate road, the hospice stands within the

grounds of the Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother Hospital and is surrounded by

nearly two acres of stunning natural gardens.



ICONOGRAPHY RETURNS TO THANET

Iconography is the art of the Christian church from its earliest times. As the doctrines of the Church developed, so gradually a means was created to express those doctrines in visual form. As the church moved from a persecuted underground movement to ultimately a state religion, so the images changed from an encoded and symbolic art inscribed in hidden places to a full and glorious exploration of salvation history made in rich and rare materials and techniques.

Icons take many forms. They are sometimes portable, usually painted on wooden panels but sometimes embroidered for use on altar cloths or priestly vestments and sometimes made in ceramic. There are permanent frescoes and mosaics found on the walls of churches and cathedrals. There are icons made in ivory, gold, silver, bronze to be found on the vessels and furnishings of places of Christian worship. These images were and still are venerated and used as a focus for prayer, an interface between earth and heaven, God and man.

Panel icons used natural materials and primitive tools, preparing boards, gold leaf and pigments with great difficulty and expenditure of time and effort. Some artificial pigments were known in ancient times, such as vermilion, lead white and (later) synthetic ultramarine.

Such pigments were very expensive. Lapis Lazuli was more expensive than gold!

Traditionally, iconography was passed from generation to generation and often, though not always, studied in a monastic setting. Lay iconographers sometimes formed groups and worked together. By this means standards of skill and artistic achievement reached great heights.

However, the monasteries were the repositories and guardians of learning and skill, and as such iconography would have been practiced at Minster Abbey. From its

earliest times in the seventh century we know that Minster Abbey had a scriptorium which would have copied and illustrated texts of the Holy Scriptures and the Church Fathers; curing their own skins and grinding their own inks for the purpose.

Iconography is still a living tradition,

It takes two directions, traditional and modern. The former deviates little in style, content and method, using Byzantine types

as model and guide. The latter as you might guess is more open to innovation.
