## PARISH COUNCIL REMINDER TO HOUSEHOLDERS/TENANTS

They also ask that those with gravel drives keep the gravel off of the roads and pavements by regularly sweeping it back onto their property.

The Community Warden will be monitoring both of these aspects.

*Dear Mrs Chapman,*

*Thank you for your e-mails about buses between Minster and Canterbury and I hope I have some good news for you. We have received quite a few requests to provide buses between Minster and Canterbury and from 5th September 2011 we will be revising route 622 (via Plucks Gutter and Wingham) which currently provides a journey from Minster to Canterbury at 0720 on Mondays to Fridays and a return trip at 1620 on schooldays only.*

*Route 622 will be renumbered 11 and will run on Mondays and Saturdays between Westwood Cross and Canterbury via Manston, Minster, Monkton, Wingham to Canterbury. Journeys from Minster Church will be at 0720*

*(Mondays to Fridays, 0750 (Saturdays), 0930, 1215, 1415, 1615 (Saturdays and School Holidays), 1626 (schooldays). Return journeys from Canterbury will be at 0950, 1045, 1250, 1620 (Mondays to Fridays only) and 1740.*

*You will also be able to travel from Minster to Westwood Cross at 1043, 1143, 1343 and 1713 returning from there at 1154, 1354 and 1554*

*(Saturdays and School Holidays only).*

*A printed public timetable will be available after the Bank Holiday and a timetable will be on our website about a week before that.*

*We have in the past considered providing a stop for the 9 on the A253 but have been unable to find a suitable stopping place.*

To whom it may concern. I attended the Minster Show with my Mother and 6

year old Son and I am sorry to report we were more than a little disappointed, compounded by the fact we had to pay £3 each!! Since when has a child over 5 been considered an adult? I don't see how you can justify charging „full"

price for a child particularly when most activities inside the ground were at an extra cost.

Whilst I appreciate that you need to raise money and that you may have had to pay for the appearance of Pat Marsh, but at least charging ½ the amount for say 6-11 year olds would be more acceptable, although that said I still feel

£3 for adults is too expensive.

The Birchington Summer Festival is free of charge and seems to have more there and recently we went to a craft fair at Quex Park in aid of the Air Ambulance which was £1 entry and had dozens of stalls of quality products. I felt the stalls at Minster were poorly laid out and offered little more than boot fair products in some cases. In short we got very

little for our £9+! The live music was good but felt a little disconnected from the rest of the stalls I'm sorry to say we would probably not attend again Name and Address withheld (not a villager)

(Karen did reply to this letter directly, she gave them a breakdown of income and expenses and even offered them their money back, but so far she hasn't had any reply)

# Peter Frederick Crook

**August 3rd 1937 – July 27th 2011**

Peter was buried at St Mary Magdalene Church, Monkton on Tuesday August 11th close to where his parents lay at rest.

Below is a „Reflection on Peter’s Life” as read at his funeral by David Kemp, followed by „The Horse Prayer” as read by Michael Kemp Peter Crook

a Man of Town and Country

Peter was born at Warehams, Surrey Dock Dining Rooms in Rotherhithe, the only child of Marie and George Crook. Peter’s Father had been in the First World War and among other medals won the Military Medal. These medals will go to the Regimental Museum. When he married, Peter’s father was a docker and his Mother worked with her Mother and sister running the two dining rooms. They also owned a large country house in East Hanney in Berkshire. This was sold just before the war. When Peter’s Grandmother, Mrs Wareham died in her fifties the business was sold.

At the outbreak of the Second World War Mr and Mrs Crook together with Peter decided to leave London and move to East Hanney where they had spent many holidays. They lived in a tin building which was next to the Pub and Mr Crook worked in a local government factory.

The authorities wanted to take Peter to Canada but Mrs Crook wanted them all to stay together as a family.

This is where Peter becomes a Country Boy as he spent many hours at the farm of Mr and Mrs Hammond where he helped with milking the cows by hand and seeing the many other animals on the Farm especially the horses.

He loved this village and went back there many times to visit friends who he and the family had met during their stay there. I went with him twice so had to do the rounds.

Peter had many memories of his life there especially in the frugal time of the war. His Dad kept his own chickens and made a small sectional Chicken House which survives today in perfect condition. It was moved from East Hanney to Eltham which became their next home, with Peter’s Aunt Ivy living in the same road. Ivy never married as her boyfriend died just before the war.

Peter, his Parents, Ivy and the Chicken House moved to Westgate and opened a Guest House in Cuthbert Road

and eventually he went to King Ethelbert's School Birchington.

The family then decided to move to Beresford Lodge at Monkton together with the Chicken House. On leaving school Peter went to work at a nursery in Birchington, now built on. He then went to work on the Farm at Sevenscore where they still had many working horses, which as you know were his greatest love. He told me many tales about the people he worked with 17

especially Bert Cooper and his wife and daughter Mrs Grove with whom he enjoyed having a laugh with in the Chemist.

Peter then went to work at Monkton Court Farms for Bert Smith. This was without doubt the highlight of his life. He worked with Tom Ovenden and Billy Andrews with the Cart Horses and he told me many stories of working with them. How wonderfully the horses were looked after and the work they did.

He had a great knowledge from veterinary practices to harness, field and stable work. He worked with Boxer and was also an expert in leather work having all the tools connected with that trade. These were given to him by Mr Stace a Saddler in Birchington employed by Barrows. Another good friend of his was Fred Harrison, the Monkton Blacksmith from whom he learnt a great deal about the repair of farm equipment.

His parents then decided to open a Greengrocers shop in Minster where the Poodle Parlour is now. They rented and then purchased the land where I now live. Peter grew salad crops, this necessitated Peter leaving Monkton Court Farms and coming home to work the land at Monkton and Minster. He also grew Bedding Plants, Tomatoes, Cucumbers and Runners Beans as well as keeping pigs and, of course, chickens in the chicken house.

At this time he bought his first horse Dolly from travelling folk at Horsmonden and entered the Minster Flower Show with a decorated float. He also showed his turnouts at Regents Park and ploughed in a number of Ploughing Matches in Kent and Surrey. Peter was also filmed ploughing with his horse for the Watch with Mother Children's series Pogles Wood.

After his parents deaths he sold the land in Minster and Beresford Lodge at Monkton. Now another journey for the Chicken House, this went to Staple where Peter purchased Staple Nurseries and grew excellent crops of bedding and pot plants as well as vegetables. This Nursery had five

acres of land so it enabled him to have a paddock for grazing and making hay for his horse.

Subsequently he bred another horse so he had two Shire horses. These were used to work the land and for show.

His Aunt Ivy moved to Staple with him as she was his rock in every way as she had lived with him virtually all her life. Ivy was very calm and understood his many, sometimes difficult ways. On her death Peter sold the nursery and moved to St Mildred's Road. This big upheaval upset him and he said his world was finished. Peter did not like the way the modern world lived, and seemed to live in the past especially with the horse world. The Chicken House also came to Minster and now resides in his beautiful garden which he opened for the Church at Open Gardens weekends.

His greatest wish was to have a Cart Horse at his funeral and to be buried next to his parents and Ivy so that he could see the Farm he worked at.

I have known Peter for 60 Years meeting him at the Thanet Young Farmers Club. He was a very good sincere friend and I and his many friends will miss him very much.

He is now at peace with his beloved horses.

# The Horse Prayer

I'm only a horse dear master,  
but my heart is warm and true  
and I'm willing to work my hardest  
for the pleasure of pleasing you.  
Good corn and hay and water  
are all that I wish to ask,  
and a warm dry bed to rest on  
when I've finished my daily task.  
Don't strike me in careless anger  
if I'm slow to understand  
but encourage my drooping spirits  
with a gentle voice and hand.  
And finally oh master, when I am old and feeble  
and my long life's work is done,  
Don't sell me to cruel owners  
to be slaved till my last breath,  
but grant me the untold blessing  
of a quick and painless death.  
That as you have always found me  
a loyal and faithful friend,  
my years of faithful service  
may be crowned by a peaceful end.  
I plead in the name of the Saviour,  
who cares when sparrows fall ...

## CONSUMER RIGHTS – AN INTRODUCTION

When you buy something the law gives you certain rights that protect you if it's faulty. You may also have extra rights depending on where you buy the item and how you pay for it. Find out what your rights are and who can help if things go wrong.

### Your consumer rights

When you buy an item from a trader (eg a shop or online shop) the law says the item must be:

of satisfactory quality – last for the time you would expect it to and be free of any defects

fit for purpose – fit for the use described and any specific use you made clear to the trader

as described – match the description on packaging or what the trader told you If an item doesn't meet any of these rights, it is faulty and you will usually have the right to a:

repair / replacement / refund

These rights apply to most items you buy from a shop, including sale items. You may have additional rights to these if you have a warranty.

If the trader makes a fault known to you and you buy the item, you can't return it unless you discover a different fault.

You have fewer rights if you buy your item from a private seller, eg in an online auction or from a newspaper advert. The items only have to match the description given by the seller and be theirs to sell.

You also have rights if you buy a service or sign up to a contract, eg if you hire a builder or join a gym.

### Returning items to a shop

# Keep your receipts

You will need 'proof of purchase' to return faulty items to a shop You will need some „proof of purchase" to return faulty items to a shop such as: a receipt / a bank statement / the shop"s packaging a witness – someone who saw you buy it

If there is nothing wrong with the item, you don"t have the legal right to return it.

Some shops may let you return the item if you provide the proof of purchase that the shop wants, eg a receipt. Check the shop"s returns policy before you buy.

## Your right to change your mind

You usually have seven working days to cancel your order and ask for your money back if you buy something:

online / over the phone / by mail order (eg from a catalogue) on your doorstep (eg when a salesman visits your home) You don"t have this right if your item is:

personalised or made to order / perishable, eg food or flowers a newspaper or magazine / a financial product (eg a loan) a CD, DVD or computer software where the security seal has been broken If an item isn"t delivered on time

If you buy something online, over the phone or by mail order, you have the right to cancel the order and get your money back:

when an item doesn"t arrive on the given delivery date where no delivery date is given and the item doesn"t arrive 30 days after placing your order

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## Consumer rights (cont"d..)

These rights only apply if you buy from a trader based in the European Union (EU).

If the trader is based outside of the EU, you will need to check with the trader to see which country"s law applies.

## How you pay and your rights

If you pay for something using a credit agreement, credit card or Visa or Maestro debit card, you may have additional rights if:

there"s a fault with the item or service

the trader has gone out of business

If you paid for something costing between £100 and £30,000 using a credit card or credit agreement, you can make a claim from your finance company.

If you've paid using Visa, Mastercard or Maestro, you may be able to claim your money back through their „chargeback“ scheme. You will need to contact the card company to make a claim.

Pricing and your rights

The price of any item you buy should be clearly priced. If an item has been wrongly priced by mistake, you don't have the right to buy it at that price. For example if a coat is priced at £29, but is actually £299 when you get to the till.

If you are unhappy with the correct price, you don't have to buy the item.

If you need to make a complaint

If you need to complain about something you've bought, always go back to the trader. Also check any warranty you have to see what protection it gives you, eg for accidental damage.

If you don't hear back from the trader or don't agree with their response, you should make a complaint in writing.

You can also get advice on disputes from Consumer Direct, the government funded consumer advice service.

If there's a problem with an item or service

If there's a problem with something you've bought, you should tell the trader as soon as possible. You can complain face-to-face, over the phone or in writing.

Before you complain:

make sure you can prove you bought the item or service from the trader, eg with a receipt, invoice or bank statement

find out if the trader has a complaints procedure you need to follow, eg a form you need to fill in online

collect all the documents that will support your complaint such as quotes, photos of the fault and emails between you and the trader  
When you complain:

quote a reference, account or order number if you have one  
describe the items or service you bought

say what the problem is – what happened and when it happened say how you want the trader to sort it out – check your rights to see what the trader needs to do

explain any actions you've already taken – including who you spoke to and what happened

give the trader a deadline for replying, eg 14 days keep a copy of any letters, emails etc for your records Contact Consumer Direct
